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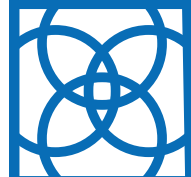

ABOUT THE COURSE

PEDIATRIC SAFE TRAINING FOR HEALTHCARE PROFESSIONALS

The purpose of this course is to train physicians, nurse practitioners, physician assistants, and registered nurses to conduct careful and competent evidentiary examinations for children and adolescents suspected of being victims of sexual abuse or sexual assault. It places special emphasis on training examiners to follow the California Medical Protocol in the use of the OES 925 and 930 forms in the documentation of injuries and the collection of evidence. The course focuses on pediatric and adolescent techniques and issues that will assist the examiner to accomplish the task in a gentle, non-traumatic manner.

COURSE GOALS

To provide participants with an understanding of:

- How the information and skills learned in this course will meet the needs of children and teens who have been acutely or non-acutely sexually victimized, as well as the needs of law enforcement and Child Protective Services (CPS)
- How to gather relevant information about the victimization that can guide the forensic examination
- How and why victimization of children and adolescents occurs and how those dynamics impact the evidentiary examination process
- Anogenital anatomy of children and teens
- How to conduct a medical forensic examination of an acutely or non-acutely sexually victimized child or adolescent
- How to collect relevant evidence according to California Medical Protocol if examining an acutely victimized patient
- The types of acute injuries likely to have occurred in the process of victimization
- The types of residual injuries that may present non-acutely
- How to document findings and procedures in a forensically defensible manner
- Guidelines for medical care and treatment following sexual assault and non-acute sexual abuse
- Guidelines that may be used in formulating forensic medical conclusions
- The California judicial system to prepare examiners to respond to subpoenas and to testify in cases of child and adolescent sexual abuse

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ABOUT THE CALIFORNIA CLINICAL FORENSIC MEDICAL TRAINING CENTER

Penal Code Section 13823.93 established the foundation and statutory authority for the California Clinical Forensic Medical Training Center (CCFMTC). Funding is provided through a grant from the Governor's Office of Emergency Services. Training is provided for healthcare providers to identify, evaluate, and document injuries; to better manage the healthcare consequences of abuse; and to effectively collaborate with social services, law enforcement agencies, advocacy organizations, and the criminal justice system. CCFMTC also provides training to law enforcement officers, district attorneys, public defenders, investigative social workers, and judges on medical evidentiary examination procedures and the interpretation of findings. The Center trains medical professionals to effectively identify, evaluate and treat victims of child abuse and neglect, sexual assault, domestic violence, elder abuse, and abuse of persons with disabilities.

CONTINUING EDUCATIONAL STATEMENT

This training is sponsored by the Rady Children's Hospital and Health Center - San Diego in cooperation with the California Clinical Forensic Medical Training Center, UC Davis Children's Hospital, Sacramento. Rady Children's Hospital - San Diego is accredited by the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education. Physicians may claim up to 28 hours of Category 1 CME credit. ONLINE TRAINING PRECEDES CLASSROOM TRAINING IN SACRAMENTO

The California Clinical Forensic Medical Training Center (CCFMTC) is introducing a new online component to the Pediatric SAFE Training.
